



### WW2 - Spitfires and Hurricanes



During the Battle of Britain in July 1940, the RAF had a total of 527 Hurricanes and 321 Spitfires to face the Luftwaffe's 2,700 planes.



The Spitfire is the most famous plane of World War Two. Its ground-breaking design and superior specifications gave the British a decisive advantage fighting the Luftwaffe in the Battle of Britain.

Arthur Smith Sergeant

Arthur joined the RAF in 1936 and then the 66 Squadron in July 1940.

After he moved to Kenley on 4th September he was in combat over Ashford Kent where his Spitfire was shot down. Arthur baled out and was seriously wounded. He was rushed to hospital but sadly died from his injuries two days later. Arthur was 22 years old. He is buried close to Kenley in St Luke's Churchyard, Whyteleafe.

### Summary (and a bit of fun!)
